Communication Skills for Low Incidence Populations September 26, 2014

Teaching communication skills to students with severe and multiple disabilities can be challenging. This session will target strategies such as identifying existing forms of communication, determining the communicative function of a student's behaviors, and evaluating the communication demands of the environment. In addition, this training will help providers design individualized interventions to achieve functional outcomes and help create structured opportunities for communication throughout a student's day. An integrated, collaborative approach to communication intervention will be emphasized.

Every Move Counts: Sensory-Based Strategies for Identifying Appropriate Technological Interventions for Individuals with Severe and Profound Differences September 30, 2014–October 1, 2014

This workshop will present a systematic method for assessing individuals with severe developmental differences in order to identify abilities and interests on which functional technological applications can be developed. Using videotaped examples, participants will be presented with an objective and systematic way to gather the information necessary to determine 1) individual technological needs, 2) optimum access methods, 3) intrinsically motivating events, 4) functional vocabulary and symbol system(s) for overlay development, 5) appropriate goals and objectives, 6) implementation strategies, and 7) data collection formats for monitoring progress. Participants will receive a current edition of *Every Move Counts: Clicks and Chats*.

Service Delivery Models: I Don't Have Time! October 24, 2014

Learn a framework for implementing various speech and language service delivery models. Focus will be provided on intensive service, 3-to-1, and coteaching delivery methods. As our workload increases, we need to find better practices. Participants will gain effective and fun strategies to use as speech-language pathologists and will walk away energized and ready to tackle the school year.

Participants will leave with practical skills and knowledge they can immediately add to their existing practice.

Understanding and Nurturing the Communicative Competence in Young Learners with Significant Disabilities

Learn about communication assessment and instruction for young learners who are nonverbal and have multiple disabilities. Explore instruction, practical exercises, and case studies to demonstrate the strategies being described. Gain insight on how to encourage children with significant disabilities, including children with vision and hearing loss, to demonstrate and further develop their ability and desire to communicate. This workshop will include understanding how to use the Communication Matrix (Rowland 2004) assessment, research-based instructional strategies for the child at the presymbolic level of communication, and instructional strategies for the child who may be ready for communication through tangible symbol systems, such as pictures, photos, and three-dimensional symbols, but is not yet able to use abstract symbols.

Emergent Balanced Literacy for Preschool and Early Elementary March 3, 2015

Preschoolers are **not** too young to begin their literacy journey. The key is to understand and support the earliest stages of literacy learning and scaffold that learning through highly motivational activities. This workshop will demonstrate how students with moderate to significant disabilities can be active participants in all areas of a balanced literacy program (shared reading, emergent writing, phonemic awareness, and self-selected reading). You will learn about assessment tools, videos, data, and specific instructional strategies. We will also share tips for getting **everyone** on board and excited about pushing for quality, research-based emergent literacy instruction. This fast-paced workshop will combine lecture, demonstration, and brainstorming activities. Even veteran literacy instructors will discover exciting new approaches using tablets to engage young learners in meaningful literacy instruction. Each participant will receive a CD with assessment and intervention materials.

Ethical Practices: A Guide to SLP Responsibilities When Training and Using Interpreters Available for 30 days following registration

Evaluating and treating students and clients with limited English proficiency can be challenging for speech-language pathologists (SLP)—particularly when an SLP does not speak the student's native language.
