


## Passage and Question on Screen together - navigate each separately

Having one window for the passage and a separate window with the question allows the student to constantly see the question, while scrolling through the passage searching for the answer. This takes a certain cognitive load balance off the student allowing them to focus on searching for the answer without having to keep the question in working memory.

Most word processing programs have the ability to resize the writing window allowing two or more screens or windows side by side. In Word for example, clicking the Restore Down button - top right of the document - allows you to resize the window to any size needed, and position it on screen.



Classroom Suite has the ability to create side by side text boxes on a page, and the text box can scroll depending on how much information is in it or how much you want displayed.
